A Legacy of Leadership

Strong, positive, and consistent senior leaders can transform the school year for the entire high-school student body.

high-school year ebbs and flows with the leadership of the senior class. The senior class is the polestar for the entire highschool student body. The senior class

sets the tone and the social order. Optimally, the class self-regulates the conduct of their peers. Everyone does better when seniors motivate and direct their peers. The senior class leads the way as the keeper of school values and customs. Senior leaders send a message to the student body that they have a stake in the ownership of *their* school. A "that isn't cool" admonition can turn bad behavior around in an instant. Administration and senior class teachers and sponsors develop a sturdy bond for a common purpose: the good of the school. Strong, positive, and consistent senior leaders can transform the school year for the entire high-school student body. Each senior class provides a material legacy for successive senior classes.

Leadership in a high school generally falls under two headings: built into the infrastructure like the role of the class president. The second category is selfappointed, exercised through personal initiative. A perfect example of this second sort, which presents itself only in tight knit, fairly small communities, came up on Friday night at the home games against Northwood Academy, a traditional rival. The gym was packed, SRO in the student section, the same in the Home stands. The scene was made for an historic moment, one that our student section knew would happen. They flashed posters created for the game congratulating Cooper Kowalski on reaching 1,000 career points, a sure thing in the varsity boys game wrapping up the evening. Cooper did not disappoint his fans; in fact, he scored his thousandth career point on a spectacular alley-oop perfectly timed above the cylinder by Dame Junior, the point guard. Our crowd went wild, celebrating a milestone with a talented senior who has drawn serious looks from college recruiters. At half time of the game, I had walked down from my perch against a wall and encountered three senior girls, who proudly and jubilantly showed me their sweet poster anticipating the gleeful moment. It stood out across the gym: we all had seen it energetically displayed. They were thrilled for their fellow senior. The encounter with the girls was icing on the cake for Cooper's accomplishment and the team's performance. Our students do a great job of stepping up on behalf of a fellow student's achievement or recognition.

My teammates and I are working on enhancements in the senior year to promote the visibility of our seniors. We already have willing and capable students and a scale and culture that endorse close relationships. With this platform, our administrative leadership team is instituting measures to give seniors more abundant means to be seen and heard. One critical adjustment is enriching the senior year curriculum to give seniors a compelling reason to be on campus. We are planning to offer a growing number of electives, some dual-credit, to allow students to deepen their inquiry and widen their scope. Two dual-credit elective classes that we anticipate will interest our students are: Psychology and Sociology, the former taught by our own Mrs. Roy and the Sociology course by a tenured Citadel professor. The curricular enrichment should result in seniors' retaining a modified version of their current

mobility but bolstered presence on campus. We are giving ourselves greater flexibility to offer additional electives by scheduling one semester, 1/2 credit electives.

Aiming to spotlight the seniors for the rest of the student body, we launched a daily routine in which every senior presented the "Word of the Day" and the "Quotation of the Day" twice during the year. This year we completed one rotation of WOD/QOD in the fall. This semester each senior presents a 350-500 word statement of a core belief. The program is designed on the model that NPR created on a weekly basis, in its first iteration inviting celebrities to present deeply- held beliefs and in its second incarnation, in recent years, featuring ordinary listeners. We begin Week Three tomorrow. The presentations have been thoughtful and touching, providing often a new perspective on the senior presenter.

Faculty and staff have been invited to present statements. We will produce professionally bound editions for the school archives and the HOS office as well as bound copies for each senior. I think that seniors who received this initiative politely but with muted enthusiasm have enjoyed writing their statements.

THE DAFFODIL PROJECT

In the winter of school year 2021-2022, the students of First Baptist School planted over 1,000 Daffodil bulbs to remember the children of the Holocaust. Since that time, we have planted 250-500 more bulbs each winter in our Daffodil bed behind the Academic Building on our James

Island Campus. Through the laborious efforts of the C.R.E.A.T.E club to maintain the bed each school year, the tolerance of our spectators and community when the bed is dormant and weed-ridden most of the year, and the patience of our maintenance team and administration, we are once again pleased to welcome back new growth in the 2024 emergence of the Daffodils! This is an important project as partners of the worldwide Daffodil Project to not forget the Holocaust or other incidence of genocide around the world. We encourage you to take a look at the beautiful bed full of yellow stars as a reminder to never forget the atrocities played out in human history and those that may be currently playing out against people around the globe.

Being a parent is oh so hard! After my first child was born, I remember the panic I felt as the hospital let me leave with him. That seemed really irresponsible on the hospital's part. I had never kept a human alive before. What if he cried? What if he was cold? What if he spit up? What if he refused to eat? What if I messed things up?

I had no idea how to be a mom. My mother left when I was five, and I had a step-mom who did not love me as her own. I had no earthly example to draw from. I was familiar with the sting of abandonment and the feeling of being a burden. I knew I never wanted my children to experience that version of a mom.

As I cried out to God for help, I heard a whisper deep in my heart: "You may not know what to do, but you know what NOT to do, and that is a great place to start."

That is how I started my parenting journey. I started by NOT doing the things that would hurt my children, and I found that what filled the empty spaces was love and nurturing.

As I enter a new season of parenting teenagers, I feel the same panic creep in. I've never raised teenagers before! I have no idea what I'm doing! I'm just making things up as I go along. What if I mess things up?

I have to remind myself of that whisper I heard many years ago: "You may not know what to do, but you know what NOT to do, and that is a great place to start."

That is how my family landed at FBS. I knew the school options I was NOT going to take, and that led me to the school we would call home. Just like before, God has filled the empty spaces with love and nurturing.

If the pressure of parenting is crushing you, may you find peace and hope in starting with what NOT to do. We don't have to have all the answers. It is God who fills in the gaps. **"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in Him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit."** Romans 15:13

Attention Seniors




